

Please read the following safety guidelines

The first thing to do after purchasing your air-gun is to "read the manual"

Remember, always wear eye protection when handling your air-gun,

Learn how to handle, load, unload, operate, fire and care for your air-gun.

An air-gun is not a toy, so do not play with it as such! It is a potentially dangerous weapon that can cause serious harm or death.

Always keep the air-gun pointed in a safe direction, NEVER point any weapon loaded or unloaded, at any person or anything you do not intend to shoot.

Know your target and what is beyond your target, if you are not ABSOLUTELY sure of what it is you are aiming at, DO NOT DO FIRE!

Always keep your air-gun unloaded until ready to fire and make sure it is unloaded before cleaning.

Keep your finger off the trigger until you are actually aiming at the target and ready to shoot.

Never rely on an air-gun's "safety" mechanism to protect you from unsafe handling. A gun's safety is a mechanical device, not a substitute for good common sense and good safety practices.

Never leave an air-gun unattended, in a way that it may fall over or that a child may come into contact with it.

Store air-gun and pellets separately beyond the reach of children. Make sure the air-gun and pellets are locked and secured so children and untrained individuals will be denied access.

Never brandish your air-gun in public, it may confuse people and may be a crime in your jurisdiction. It is very possible that a police officer or the general public will think that you have a firearm, this could cause un-needed problems.

Never Look down your barrel for any reason what-so-ever, unless it is detached, use a telescoped mirror if you must visually inspect the inside of your barrel while assembled.

When traveling by air with your air-guns, be sure to REDUCE the air pressure in all air tanks and air-bottles (contact the airline for safe allowable pressures)
